SEEKING WISDOM

If God were to speak to us and tell us to ask for anything we want, what would we say? A financially secure life? Health for ourselves and our families? Safety from all the dangers of the world? To how many of us would it occur to ask for wisdom? We just don't think about it much. We think we know how to run our families, our work, our politics, but how many mistaken ideas do we really have, and how do those work out? Do we treat others, even those we dislike, with kindness and understanding? Solomon asked God for the wisdom to know right from wrong and how to govern God's vast people. God was pleased with this request, and granted it to Solomon in abundance. Can we ask for the same in our lives? Would our lives be happier if we were wiser? "We know that all things work for good for those who love God" (Romans 8:28).

THE KINGDOM OF GOD IS LIKE . . .

Parables and more parables. What have we to learn about the reign of God from so many parables? The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field. The kingdom of heaven is like a merchant searching for fine pearls. The kingdom of heaven is like a net thrown into the sea. These parables are not hard to understand, for they all point to something valuable being searched for: a treasure, a pearl, good fish. Those who search for these things give up what they have to acquire these precious things. Those who search are praised for their wisdom in valuing what they find more than what they already have. Even the fishermen can distinguish what is good from what is useless and to be discarded.

The kingdom of heaven is something precious to be sought, even above the good things we have in this world. It is more important than anything we already have and treasure. Jesus says that at the end of the age when the good shall be separated from the bad, the good will enjoy the happiness of the kingdom of heaven.

THE NEW AND THE OLD

It is holy wisdom that allows us to realize how valuable the kingdom is. One more parable ends this reading: "Then every scribe who has been instructed in the kingdom of heaven is like the head of a household who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old" (Matthew 13:52). It is like the Church, which knows what to keep from the traditions of the past and what to cherish in the present time. Tradition is something passed down from generation to generation, but not necessarily unchanged. For example, we always have cake to celebrate birthdays. And yet, perhaps in the past that always meant a white or yellow cake with vanilla frosting. Today, it can mean a chocolate cake, an ice cream cake, or even a fruit pie! It can have the number of candles of the birthday person's age, or a candle for each decade and one for each subsequent year, or one big candle. It can even have, as once seen in a catalogue, Roman numeral candles to spell out the years! Traditions can change and still convey the truths they represent. So it is with the Tradition of the Church. The wise leaders bring forth both the new and the old, and seek in the kingdom what is good.

BUSCANDO SABIDURÍA

Si Dios hablara con nosotros y nos dijera que pidamos lo que queramos, ¿qué diríamos? ¿Una vida financieramente segura? ¿Salud para nosotros y nuestras familias? ¿Seguridad de todos los peligros del mundo? ¿Cuántos de nosotros pensaríamos en pedir sabiduría? No pensamos mucho en eso. Creemos que sabemos cómo dirigir nuestras familias, nuestro trabajo, nuestra política, pero ¿cuántas ideas equivocadas tenemos realmente, y cómo funcionan? ¿Tratamos a los demás, incluso a aquellos que no nos gustan, con bondad y comprensión? Salomón le pidió a Dios la sabiduría para distinguir el bien del mal y cómo gobernar al vasto pueblo de Dios. Dios estaba complacido con esta petición, y se la concedió a Salomón en abundancia. ¿Podemos pedir lo mismo en nuestras vidas? ¿Nuestras vidas serían más felices si fuéramos más sabios? “Sabemos que todas las cosas funcionan para bien para los que aman a Dios” (Romanos 8:28).

EL REINO DE DIOS ES COMO. . .

Parábolas y más parábolas. ¿Qué es lo que tenemos que saber acerca del Reino de Dios de varias parábolas? El reino de los Cielos es como un tesoro enterrado en un campo. El reino de los Cielos es como un vendedor de perlas finas. El reino de los Cielos es como una red arrojada al mar. Estas parábolas no son difíciles de entender, pues se enfocan en algo valioso que se tiene que buscar: un tesoro, una perla, una buena pesca. Aquellos que buscan estas cosas renuncian a lo que tienen para conseguir lo que buscan. Aquellos que se atreven a buscar se les reconoce su sabiduría al valorar más lo que están buscando que lo que ya tienen. Aun el pescador puede distinguir lo que es bueno de lo que es inútil y lo desecha.

El reino de los Cielos es algo precioso que se tiene que buscar, aún por encima de las buenas cosas que tenemos en este mundo. Es más importante que cualquier cosa que tenemos y atesoramos. Jesús dice que al final de los tiempos cuando se separe lo bueno de lo malo, la buena voluntad disfrutará la felicidad del reino de los Cielos.

LO NUEVO Y LO ANTIGUO

Es la sabiduría divina que nos permite darnos cuenta lo valioso que el reino es. Una parábola termina esta lectura: “todo escriba instruido en las cosas del reino de los Cielos es semejante al padre de familia, que va sacando de su tesoro cosas nuevas y cosas antiguas” (Mateo 13:52). Es como la Iglesia, que sabe qué conservar de las tradiciones del pasado y qué apreciar del tiempo presente. La tradición es algo que se pasa de generación en generación, aunque no necesariamente sin cambio. Por ejemplo, siempre tenemos pastel para celebrar un cumpleaños. Y, sin embargo, quizá eso en el pasado era tener pasteles con decoración blanca o amarilla y de sabor vainilla. Hoy, puede ser un pastel de chocolate, un pastel con helado, o un choco flan. Puede tener tantas velitas que representen la edad de la persona del cumpleaños, o una vela por cada decena de años y una por el cada año subsecuente, o una velita más grande. Puede tener, lo vi una vez en un catálogo, números romanos para deletrear los años. Las tradiciones pueden cambiar y aun así transmitir la verdad de aquello que representan. Lo mismo pasa con la Tradición de la Iglesia. Los líderes sabios aportan lo nuevo y lo antiguo, y buscan en el Reino de Dios lo que es bueno.







HOMILY OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS*Sunday, 14 June 2020*

“Remember all the way which the Lord your God has led you” (*Deut* 8:2). Today’s Scripture readings begin with this command of Moses: *Remember!* Shortly afterwards Moses reiterates: “Do not forget the Lord, your God” (v.14). Scripture has been given to us that we might overcome our forgetfulness of God. How important it is to remember this when we pray! As one of the Psalms teaches: “I will call to mind the deeds of the Lord; yes, I will remember your wonders of old” (77:11). But all those wonders too, that the Lord has worked in our own lives. It is vital to remember the good we have received. If we do not remember it, we become strangers to ourselves, “passers-by” of existence. Without memory, we uproot ourselves from the soil that nourishes us and allow ourselves to be carried away like leaves in the wind. If we do remember, however, we bind ourselves afresh to the strongest of ties; we feel part of a living history, the living experience of a people. Memory is not something private; it is the path that unites us to God and to others. This is why in the Bible the memory of the Lord must be passed on from generation to generation. Fathers are commanded to tell the story to their sons, as we read in a beautiful passage. “When your son asks you in time to come, ‘What is the meaning of the decrees and the statutes and the ordinances which the Lord our God has commanded you?’, then you shall say to your son, ‘We were slaves... [think of the whole history of slavery!], and the Lord showed signs and wonders... before our eyes’” (*Deut* 6:20-22). You shall hand down this memory to your son.

But there is a problem: what if the chain of transmission of memories is interrupted? And how can we remember what we have only heard, unless we have also experienced it? God knows how difficult it is, he knows how weak our memory is, and he has done something remarkable: he left us a *memorial*. He did not just leave us words, for it is easy to forget what we hear. He did not just leave us the Scriptures, for it is easy to forget what we read. He did not just leave us signs, for we can forget even what we see. He gave us Food, for it is not easy to forget something we have actually tasted. He left us Bread in which he is truly present, alive and true, with all the flavor of his love. Receiving him we can say: “He is the Lord; he remembers me!” That is why Jesus told us: “Do this in remembrance of me” (1 *Cor* 11:24). *Do!* The Eucharist is not simply an act of remembrance; it is a *fact*: the Lord’s Passover is made present once again for us. In Mass the death and resurrection of Jesus are set before us. *Do this in remembrance of me*: come together and celebrate the Eucharist as a community, as a people, as a family, in order to remember me. We cannot do without the Eucharist, for it is God’s memorial. And it heals our wounded memory.

The Eucharist first heals our *orphaned memory*. We are living at a time of great orphanage. The Eucharist heals *orphaned memory*. So many people have memories marked by a lack of affection and bitter disappointments caused by those who should have given them love and instead orphaned their hearts. We would like to go back and change the past, but we cannot. God, however, can heal these wounds by placing within our memory a greater love: his own love. The Eucharist brings us the Father’s faithful love, which heals our sense of being orphans. It gives us Jesus’ love, which transformed a tomb from an end to a beginning, and in the same way can transform our lives. It fills our hearts with the consoling love of the Holy Spirit, who never leaves us alone and always heals our wounds.

Through the Eucharist, the Lord also heals our *negative memory*, that negativity which seeps so often into our hearts. The Lord heals this negative memory, which drags to the surface things that have gone wrong and leaves us with the sorry notion that we are useless, that we only make mistakes, that we are ourselves a mistake. Jesus comes to tell us that this is not so. He wants to be close to us. Every time we receive him, he reminds us that we are precious, that we are guests he has invited to his banquet, friends with whom he wants to dine. And not only because he is generous, but because he is truly in love with us. He sees and loves the beauty and goodness that we are. The Lord knows that evil and sins do not define us; they are diseases, infections. And he comes to heal them with the Eucharist, which contains the antibodies to our negative memory. With Jesus, we can *become immune to sadness*. We will always remember our failures, troubles, problems at home and at work, our unrealized dreams. But their weight will not crush us because Jesus is present even more deeply, encouraging us with his love. This is the strength of the Eucharist, which transforms us into *bringers of God*, bringers of joy, not negativity. We who go to Mass can ask: What is it that we bring to the world? Is it our sadness and bitterness, or the joy of the Lord? Do we receive Holy Communion and then carry on complaining, criticizing and feeling sorry for ourselves? This does not improve anything, whereas the joy of the Lord can change lives.

Finally, the Eucharist heals our *closed memory*. The wounds we keep inside create problems not only for us, but also for others. They make us fearful and suspicious. We start with being closed, and end up cynical and indifferent. Our wounds can lead us to react to others with detachment and arrogance, in the illusion that in this way we can control situations. Yet that is indeed an illusion, for only love can heal fear at its root and free us from the self-centeredness that imprisons us. And that is what Jesus does. He approaches us gently, in the disarming simplicity of the Host. He comes as Bread broken in order to break open the shells of our selfishness. He gives of himself in order to teach us that only by opening our hearts can we be set free from our interior barriers, from the paralysis of the heart.
