



Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

FREE TO CHOOSE

Our readings today drench us in God's kindness. The Old Testament reading, Paul's letter, and the Gospel demonstrate God's creative and personalized outreach to us. In each case, we see a different reaction to God's gestures. Elijah drinks in his consolation, recognizing God in gentle silence and going out to meet God. The Israelites, according to Saint Paul, though encountering God in a variety of ways through the centuries, ultimately reject the Messiah whom God sends to them. Peter thinks he recognizes the Lord coming to him on the water, but demands proof and grows frightened. At all times and in all places, God longs for us to believe and goes to great lengths to strengthen our faith. Ultimately, God never compels belief, but leaves us free to choose. Today's scriptures challenge us to consider our own response to God's constant work in our lives.

EMBRACING DIVERSITY

Today's readings console and challenge us, reminding us just how hard God works for us so we might have faith. God's labors are infinitely diverse, too, always tailored to fit our particular situations, personalities, and needs. In Elijah's case, he is hiding in a cave on the very same mountain where Moses once encountered God in the burning bush. Hunted by the pagan Queen Jezebel, Elijah is running for his life. While Moses experienced God in fire on this mountain, Elijah requires a gentler touch. God comes to him not in awesome displays of power, but in a "tiny whispering sound." God provides exactly the tranquility Elijah needs before sending him off on a new mission.

God's creative care for us does not always lead to faith, however. In a strikingly tender passage, Saint Paul shares his heartbreak that God's chosen people could reject Jesus, even after all God has done to prepare them for the Messiah. God has accompanied the chosen people through adoption, miracles, covenants, commandments, prophets, and kings. Despite ages of dedicated and inventive caregiving, God's people do not unite in worship of the true Messiah. The proper response to this lack of faith is sorrow, and Saint Paul pours out the "constant anguish" in his heart.

In yet another astonishingly creative gesture, God visits people in need of faith by defying the laws of nature. Matthew's Gospel describes Jesus actually walking on water to comfort his disciples during a storm at sea. After their terror subsides and the winds grow calm, faith floods the disciples' hearts. They worship Jesus, proclaiming, "Truly, you are the Son of God."

TO THE LIMIT

Sometimes God's creative overtures are almost too much to handle. In a daring effort to trust, Peter challenges Jesus to share miraculous power with him. Jesus obliges, and Peter walks on water. Peter enjoys his miracle until his natural limitations spoil his faith. Just imagine what barriers we can shatter if only we believe.

Decimonoveno Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

Algunas veces las propuestas creativas de Dios son demasiado para sobrellevar. En un atrevido esfuerzo, Pedro desafía a Jesús a compartirle su poder con él. Jesús obliga a Pedro a caminar sobre el agua. Pedro disfruta este milagro hasta que sus limitaciones naturales estropean su fe. Solo imagina que barreras podemos romper si solamente creyéramos.

LIBRE PARA ELEGIR

Nuestras lecturas de hoy nos empapa en la bondad de Dios. La lectura del Antiguo Testamento, la carta de Pablo y el Evangelio nos demuestran el alcance creativo y personalizado de Dios a nosotros. En cada caso, vemos una reacción diferente a los gestos de Dios. Elías bebe en su consuelo, reconociendo a Dios en silencio suave y saliendo a encontrarse con Dios. Los israelitas, según san Pablo, aunque se encuentran con Dios de diversas maneras a través de los siglos, en última instancia rechazan al Mesías que Dios les envía. Pedro cree que reconoce que el Señor viene a él sobre el agua, pero exige pruebas y se asusta. En todo momento y en todos los lugares, Dios anhela que creemos y hace todo lo posible para fortalecer nuestra fe. En última instancia, Dios nunca obliga a la creencia, sino que nos deja libres para elegir. Las Escrituras de hoy nos desafían a considerar nuestra propia respuesta a la obra constante de Dios en nuestra vida.

ACEPTANDO LA DIVERSIDAD

Las lecturas de hoy nos consuelan y nos desafían, solo recordándonos lo duro que Dios trabaja para nosotros para que podamos tener fe. Los trabajos de Dios son diversamente infinitos también, siempre para medirlos y acomodarlos a nuestras situaciones particulares, personalidades y necesidades. En el caso de Elías, él está escondido en una cueva en la misma montaña donde Moisés una vez encontró a Dios en la zarza ardiente. Siendo perseguido por la reina pagana Jezabel, Elías escapa por su vida. Mientras Moisés experimenta a Dios en el fuego en esta montaña, Elías requiere un toque más gentil. Dios viene a él no en una muestra extraordinaria de poder sino en el "sonido de la brisa suave". Dios provee exactamente la tranquilidad que Elías necesita antes de enviarlo a una nueva misión.

Sin embargo, el cuidado creador de Dios no siempre nos guía a la fe. En un pasaje sorprendente, san Pablo nos comparte su angustia que el pueblo elegido por Dios puede rechazar a Jesús, aún después de todo lo que Dios ha hecho para prepararlos por el Mesías. Dios ha acompañado al pueblo elegido por medio de la adopción, los milagros, la alianza, los mandamientos, los profetas y reyes. Pese a los años de dedicado e ingenioso cuidado, el pueblo de Dios no se une al culto del verdadero Mesías. La propia respuesta a esta falta de fe es el dolor, y san Pablo derrama la "constante angustia" de su corazón.

En otro asombroso gesto, Dios visita a su pueblo que necesita fe desafiando las leyes de la naturaleza. El Evangelio de Mateo describe a Jesús caminando sobre el agua para consolar a sus discípulos durante una tormenta en el mar. Después de que pasa su espanto y el viento se calma, la fe inunda a los corazones de los discípulos. Ellos alaban a Jesús, proclamando "verdaderamente, tú eres el Hijo de Dios".

**PEACE AS A JOURNEY OF HOPE:
DIALOGUE, RECONCILIATION AND ECOLOGICAL CONVERSION**

1. Peace, a journey of hope in the face of obstacles and trial

Peace is a great and precious value, the object of our hope and the aspiration of the entire human family. As a human attitude, our hope for peace is marked by an existential tension that makes it possible for the present, with all its difficulties, to be “lived and accepted if it leads towards a goal, if we can be sure of this goal, and if this goal is great enough to justify the effort of the journey”.^[1] Hope is thus the virtue that inspires us and keeps us moving forward, even when obstacles seem insurmountable. Our human community bears, in its memory and its flesh, the scars of ever more devastating wars and conflicts that affect especially the poor and the vulnerable. Entire nations find it difficult to break free of the chains of exploitation and corruption that fuel hatred and violence. Even today, dignity, physical integrity, freedom, including religious freedom, communal solidarity and hope in the future are denied to great numbers of men and women, young and old. Many are the innocent victims of painful humiliation and exclusion, sorrow and injustice, to say nothing of the trauma born of systematic attacks on their people and their loved ones.

The terrible trials of internal and international conflicts, often aggravated by ruthless acts of violence, have an enduring effect on the body and soul of humanity. Every war is a form of fratricide that destroys the human family’s innate vocation to brotherhood. War, as we know, often begins with the inability to accept the diversity of others, which then fosters attitudes of aggrandizement and domination born of selfishness and pride, hatred and the desire to caricature, exclude and even destroy the other. War is fueled by a perversion of relationships, by hegemonic ambitions, by abuses of power, by fear of others and by seeing diversity as an obstacle. And these, in turn, are aggravated by the experience of war.

As I observed during [my recent Apostolic Journey to Japan](#), our world is paradoxically marked by “a perverse dichotomy that tries to defend and ensure stability and peace through a false sense of security sustained by a mentality of fear and mistrust, one that ends up poisoning relationships between peoples and obstructing any form of dialogue. Peace and international stability are incompatible with attempts to build upon the fear of mutual destruction or the threat of total annihilation. They can be achieved only on the basis of a global ethic of solidarity and cooperation in the service of a future shaped by interdependence and shared responsibility in the whole human family of today and tomorrow”.^[2] Every threatening situation feeds mistrust and leads people to withdraw into their own safety zone. Mistrust and fear weaken relationships and increase the risk of violence, creating a vicious circle that can never lead to a relationship of peace. Even nuclear deterrence can only produce the illusion of security.

We cannot claim to maintain stability in the world through the fear of annihilation, in a volatile situation, suspended on the brink of a nuclear abyss and enclosed behind walls of indifference. As a result, social and economic decisions are being made that lead to tragic situations where human beings and creation itself are discarded rather than protected and preserved.^[3] How, then, do we undertake a journey of peace and mutual respect? How do we break the unhealthy mentality of threats and fear? How do we break the current dynamic of distrust? We need to pursue a genuine fraternity based on our common origin from God and exercised in dialogue and mutual trust. The desire for peace lies deep within the human heart, and we should not resign ourselves to seeking anything less than this.

correlative: the recognition of his or her duties with regard to others. The sense and practice of duty are themselves conditioned by the capacity for self-mastery and by the acceptance of responsibility and of the limits placed upon the freedom of individuals or the groups”.^[7]

Divisions within a society, the increase of social inequalities and the refusal to employ the means of ensuring integral human development endanger the pursuit of the common good. Yet patient efforts based on the power of the word and of truth can help foster a greater capacity for compassion and creative solidarity.

In our Christian experience, we constantly remember Christ, who gave his life to reconcile us to one another (cf. *Rom 5:6-11*). The Church shares fully in the search for a just social order; she continues to serve the common good and to nourish the hope for peace by transmitting Christian values and moral teaching, and by her social and educational works.
