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THE GREAT COMMANDMENTS

Love your neighbor. It sounds so simple. Yet it is not always easy to accomplish. Many things get in the way of taking this commandment to heart. Sometimes, it is things that get in the way, but more often, we get in the way. We tend to see things through our own perspective, rather than considering the other person's point of view. In our interactions with others, we often fail to truly listen, focusing instead on our next response or point to be made. We say we love our neighbor, right up to the point at which doing so requires some sacrifice of time, attention, or financial support, and then suddenly, a thousand reasons for keeping to ourselves emerge. Jesus knew this when he summed up the great commandments of loving God and neighbor. Notice what he said about this: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

LOVE GOD

"You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind" (Matthew 22:37). In this greatest and first commandment, Jesus describes deep and intentional love of God. Like the Thessalonians to whom Saint Paul wrote, we are to turn away from anything that could become an idol, anything that takes first place in our lives ahead of God. Loving God so completely calls us to place our lives in the heart of God, assured that when we do, all will be well. When we love God with all our heart, soul, and mind, we gradually learn to see the world and all people through the eyes of God, who is love.

LOVE NEIGHBOR

When God gave the covenant to Moses, the commandments of loving God and neighbor were clear, including what love of neighbor is all about. For example, "You shall not molest or oppress an alien, for you were once aliens yourself in the land of Egypt" (Exodus 22:20). In other words, care for the least among you; their struggles are not so different from your own. And remember, they are precious in God's sight, as are you. All are held in love by our good and gracious God. Jesus is the ultimate sign of God's love, and the perfect model of what it means to love God. Jesus teaches that real love requires sacrifice. There are moments when loving our neighbor requires us to put the other person first. No longer is it just nice to help the person who is poor, ill, lonely, in prison, homeless, or grieving. It is necessary. Their need is greater than our own. Failing to meet the person in his or her need is to ignore our very self. To love God is to love our neighbor; to love others is to love God, in whose image all are made.

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LOS GRANDES MANDAMIENTOS

Ama a tu prójimo. Suena tan simple. Sin embargo, no siempre es fácil de lograr. Muchas cosas se meten en el camino de tomar este mandamiento en serio. A veces, son cosas que se meten en el camino, pero más a menudo, nos estoramos en el camino. Tendemos a ver las cosas a través de nuestra propia perspectiva, en lugar de considerar el punto de vista de la otra persona. En nuestras interacciones con los demás, a menudo no escuchamos verdaderamente, centrándonos en nuestra próxima respuesta o punto a hacer. Decimos que amamos a nuestro prójimo, hasta el punto en que hacerlo requiere cierto sacrificio de tiempo, atención o apoyo financiero, y luego de repente, mil razones surgen para mantenernos a nosotros mismos. Jesús lo sabía cuando resumió los grandes mandamientos de amar a Dios y al prójimo. Fíjate en lo que dijo sobre esto: "Amarás a tu prójimo como a ti mismo."

AMA A DIOS

"Amarás al Señor, tu Dios, con todo tu corazón, con toda tu alma y con toda tu mente" (Mateo 22:37). En este extraordinario y primer mandamiento, Jesús describe el profundo e intencional amor de Dios. Como los tesalonicenses a quien san Pablo escribió, debemos rechazar aquello que pudiera convertirse en ídolo, cualquier cosa que tome el primer lugar en nuestras vidas por delante de Dios. Amar a Dios completamente nos llama a poner nuestras vidas en el corazón de Dios, asegurados que cuando lo hacemos, todo estará bien. Cuando amamos a Dios con todo nuestro corazón, alma y mente, poco a poco aprendemos a ver al mundo y a las personas por medio de los ojos de Dios, quien es amor.

AMA A TU PRÓJIMO

Quando Dios hizo la alianza con Moisés, los mandamientos de amor a Dios y al prójimo fueron claros, incluyendo lo que amar al prójimo significa. Por ejemplo: "no hagas sufrir ni oprimas al extranjero, porque ustedes fueron extranjeros en Egipto" (Éxodo 22:20). En otras palabras, cuida a los más necesitados; sus preocupaciones no son diferentes a las tuyas. Y recuerda que ellos son hermosos a la vista de Dios, así como tú. Todos celebran con amor por nuestro bien y gracia de Dios. Jesús es el último signo del amor de Dios, y el perfecto modelo de lo que significa amar a Dios. Jesús nos enseña lo que requiere el verdadero amor y sacrificio. Hay momentos que cuando amamos a nuestro prójimo nos exige poner a la otra persona primero. Ya no solo es necesario ser atento ayudar a otra persona porque es pobre, está enferma, sola, en prisión, es una persona sin techo, desamparada o está sufriendo. Es necesario. Sus necesidades son más grandes que las nuestras. Ignorar encontrarse con otras personas en su necesidad o preocupación es ignorarse uno mismo. Amara a Dios es amar al prójimo, amar a los demás es amar a Dios, en quien estamos hechos a imagen y semejanza.

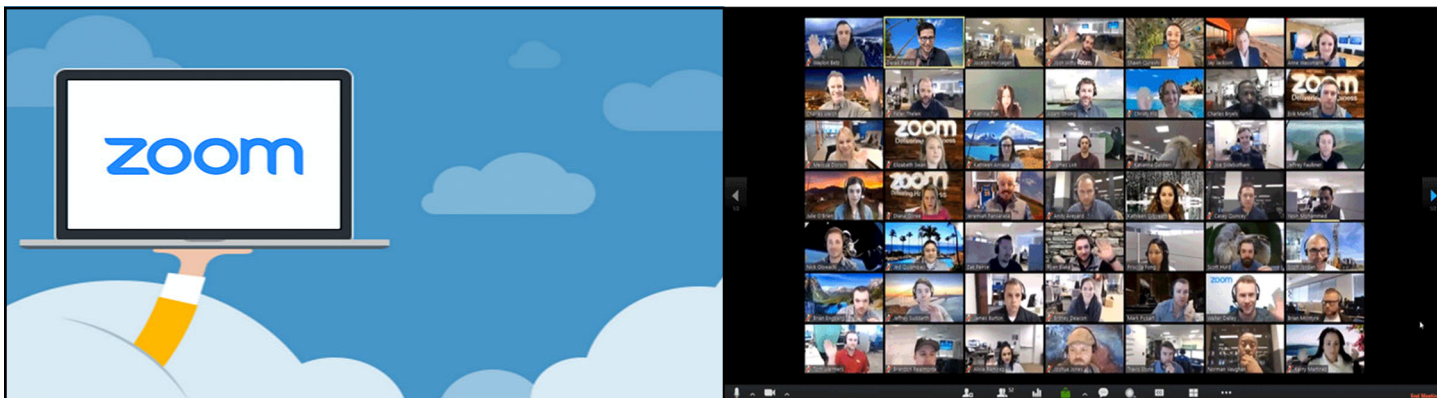

“Fratelli tutti”: a call to disrupt our lives and pay attention to the world

Fratelli tutti is “a devastating challenge to our ecological, political, economic and social life”, but above all, it is the “proclamation of an ineradicable, joyful truth, presented as a well-spring for a fatigued world.”

This is according to Professor Anna Rowlands, a renowned political theologian and member of the panel that presented Pope Francis’ third Encyclical in the Vatican’s new Synod Hall on Sunday. Speaking to Vatican Radio’s Christopher Wells, Professor Rowlands said *Fratelli tutti*, with its powerful social meditation on the Good Samaritan, who recognizes love and attention as the preeminent law and model for creative social friendship, is a call to everyone to take action. “I think that the core of this document is a call for us to stop and find a way to look at the world in a different way,” Prof. Rowlands said, noting that **Pope Francis is asking us to stop looking at the world with the eyes of indifference or cynicism.** He is asking us, she explained, **“to stop and to begin to look again.”**

A call for social action

Rowlands said the document contains a list of social actions, the first being the command that we “pay attention to the world around us, to what truly is.” Pope Francis, she continued sees reality and tells us that the only true perception of that reality is through encounter with **“the reality of all the people and of the created order.”** “His first call to us is simply to pay attention, to be with what is, and what is both the suffering and the difficulty of the world, but also its beauty and its grace,” she said.

She noted that he finds a contemplative starting point for his social teaching in his deep association with Saint Francis of Assisi, and that this is imbued in a political mysticism. **Church’s social teaching rooted in reality** Rowlands recalled that all the social teaching documents from 1891 onwards stem from a meditation by the respective Pope on the world, and on the action of the world. “*Rerum Novarum* was inspired by the action of local bishops in Germany and in the UK involved in the dockworkers strike and in industrial relations. Later documents were also inspired by movements on the ground, often ecclesial movements,” she explained.

Pope Francis, she added, is very clear that this encyclical was inspired by an interfaith dialogue and by visits and encounters he has had all over the world. So, she continued, **it begins with his engagement with a world of action and then moves into a reflective phase in which “the Pope gathers, reflects, prays, discerns and then presents this reflective response to reality.”** He does this in the hope of impelling a kind of revolution, a change of dynamics that will lead to action towards the common good. “I think that what he imagines really is this world which is based on a cycle of constant meditation and action, contemplation and action,” she said. This vision is at the heart of monastic life, it is what Bishops in the wider episcopal community are meant to do, and most certainly, it is at the heart of the task of the Bishop of Rome.

The call for a concrete response

In *Fratelli tutti*, Rowlands said, Pope Francis calls for a concrete response from all people of goodwill, regardless of their religious belonging. He does so using the parable of the Good Samaritan, because it is “utterly concrete, utterly practical, utterly immediate and utterly devastating in terms of what it means for an individual.” He’s asking us, she explained, “to be interrupted in the flow of our everyday lives; to stop and pay attention to those whom he describes as ‘foreign in our own neighborhoods’, and he doesn’t just literally mean coming from a foreign place, he means the divisions of wealth and poverty in a street, in a neighborhood, in a city.” He wants us, she continued, to think about the roles that we occupy in our professional lives “and he has a lot to say about the vocation of those in politics, of those in business etc.” Rowlands noted that the Pope also talks about the role of grass-root movements and of the importance of building a new world together with those who are most marginalized and excluded, not “for them or on their behalf.” **This is an action, she said, that requires us to build relationships in every stratum of our everyday lives. He, Pope Francis, believes that the transformation of the world will stem from that basis, but it is essential that we let ourselves be disrupted and disturbed in our normal routines, “to learn that pattern of attention and the gifts it brings.”**

Social friendship

Finally, Rowlands reflected on the meaning for Pope Francis of social friendship. **She expressed her belief that according to his conception of universal fraternity that envisages a world in which we are all interconnected, brothers and sisters and children of the same God,** and said that ‘social friendship’ is the concrete response to that realization. It’s a vision, she concluded, that leads to a structural commitment, **“to forms of action together in the world”.** So, “social friendship is the set of practices that allow us to realize universal friendship as a way of life, as a habit.”
