Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

All of you are children of the light and children of the day.
We are not of the night or of darkness.
Therefore, let us not sleep as the rest do,
but let us stay alert and sober.

1 Thessalonians 5:5-6

THE REST OF THE STORY

Paul Harvey was a popular radio broadcaster with a daily program during which he would relate a historical anecdote, but it would have a twist at the end, and then he would intone “and now you know the rest of the story.” Our scriptures today are like that. We await the coming Christ as the readings describe for us how to be good servants, but they give us a limited picture. The famous Proverbs passage, “The Valiant Wife” is edited down from the full selection (31:10–31) to just a few verses. Take a couple moments to explore the fuller selection. Psalm 128 proclaims, “Blessed are those who fear the Lord,” but in this context “fear” doesn’t mean dread and trepidation. Rather, this kind of fear means “to show awe,” and there are wonderful promises made to those who do. The letter to the Thessalonians continues the call to be alert, and Matthew shows us various ways that people might respond to God in the parable of the talents. The Gospel is presented in long and shortened versions; be sure to read the whole thing so you can get “the rest of the story.”

REMAIN IN ME

In the story of the talents, the head of the household leaves the servants “talents” or money, which they are expected to foster and develop during the leader’s absence. Today we think of talent as an innate ability or a skill. It is interesting that they were distributed “according to ability,” which would express a certain intimacy as we realize that the master knew each one, and already had an idea of their capabilities. They were not given explicit instructions like “put this in the bank” or “invest this in your portfolio” or “take piano lessons.” Rather, we are told that the goods were divided unequally. One received five, one received two, and the last received one.

BEAR MUCH FRUIT

When the head of the household returned, the outcomes were just as varied as we and our responses might be. Some people are multitalented, and capable of accomplishing many great things, like the servant who turned five into ten. Others may be more inclined to do one or two things very well and may excel in them. Still, there are some who may struggle in life, and their accomplishments are very small. But those who made use of their gifts were praised and told, “Well done, good and faithful servant.” When it came to the second coming, the return of their master, they both made some effort. The only one in whom the head of household showed any disappointment was the one who made absolutely no effort, the one who was frozen by fear or indifference. As we journey toward the kingdom, there are not always clear instructions. We are simply asked to try, to give it our best effort. There is nothing in the passage to say that these servants didn’t make mistakes along the way, but their master saw them and loved and praised them for their actions, their attempts, as God will do with us. And now you know the rest of the story.

Trigésimo Tercer Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

EL RESTO DE LA HISTORIA

Paul Harvey era un popular locutor de radio con un programa diario durante el cual relataría una anécdota histórica, pero tendría un giro al final, y luego él entonaba “y ahora conoces el resto de la historia”. Nuestras Escrituras de hoy son así. Esperamos al Cristo veniente como las lecturas nos describen cómo ser buenos siervos, pero nos dan una imagen limitada. El famoso pasaje de Proverbios, “La Esposa Valiente” se edita desde la selección completa (31:10–31) hasta unos pocos versículos. Tómese un par de momentos para explorar la selección más completa. El Salmo 128 proclama: “Bienaventurados los que temen al Señor”, pero en este contexto el “miedo” no significa temor. Más bien, este tipo de miedo significa “mostrar asombro”, y hay maravillosas promesas hechas a los que lo hacen. La carta a los tesalonicenses continúa el llamado a estar alerta, y Mateo nos muestra varias maneras en que la gente podría responder a Dios en la parábola de los talentos. El Evangelio se presenta en versiones largas y abreviadas; asegúrese de leer todo el asunto para que pueda obtener “el resto de la historia.”

PERMANECE EN MÍ

En la historia de los talentos, quien era la cabeza de la familia deja a los sirvientes “talentos” o dinero, del cual se espera que administren y multipliquen durante la ausencia del patrón. Hoy pensamos que los talentos son una destreza o habilidad innata. Es interesante que esos talentos fueran distribuidos “de acuerdo con sus habilidades” y eso podría significar que hay una cierta intimidad de parte del patrón hacia ellos y que podría conocer sus capacidades. A ellos no se les dieron instrucciones claras como “pon este dinero en el banco”, “inviértelo en donde te paguen intereses” o “con este dinero paga para tomar clases de piano”. Más bien, se nos dice que los bienes se repartieron de manera desigual. Uno recibió cinco, otro recibió dos y el último recibió uno.

DA FRUTO ABUNDANTE

Cuando el cabeza de familia regresó, los resultados no fueron tan variados como nosotros o nuestras respuestas podrían ser. Algunas personas son multitalentosas y capaces de lograr muchas cosas, como el sirviente que de cinco obtuvo diez. Otros pueden estar más inclinados a hacer una o dos cosas muy bien y pueden sobresalir en ellas. Aún así, hay algunas que pueden luchar en la vida y lograr muy poco. Pero esos que hicieron uso de sus dones fueron elogiados y se les dijo: “bien hecho, siervo bueno y fiel”. Cuando suceda la segunda venida, el regreso de su patrón, ambos habrán demostrado un esfuerzo. El único en quien el patrón mostró su desilusión fue por el que no hizo ningún esfuerzo, el que estaba como inmovilizado por el miedo o la indiferencia. En el camino hacia el reino, no siempre hay instrucciones claras. Simplemente se nos pide que lo intentemos, que hagamos nuestro mejor esfuerzo. No hay nada en el pasaje que diga que estos sirvientes no hayan cometido errores en el camino, pero su amo los vio, los amó y elogió por sus acciones, sus intentos, como Dios lo hará por nosotros. Y ahora ya conoces el resto de la historia.

Pope Francis Advent Homily; focus on St. Joseph and his silent obedience

Vatican News Release: In the homily at the morning Mass, Pope Francis said Saint Joseph “took up” the fatherhood of Jesus, “a paternity that was not his own, but God’s.” In difficulties, in troubles, in darkness, we learn from St Joseph who knew “how to walk in darkness,” “how to listen to the voice of God,” “how to go forward in silence.” That was Pope Francis’ reflection during the morning Mass at the Casa Santa Marta, commenting on the day’s Gospel. Jesus, he explained, was born of Mary, the spouse of Joseph, the son of David.

Joseph believed and obeyed

The Pope reflected on the emotions felt by Joseph when the signs of Mary’s pregnancy appeared after she returned from the house of Elizabeth: He spoke of his “doubts,” his “sorrow,” of his “suffering,” while all around him people began to murmur – the “gossip of the neighborhood.” He “did not understand,” but he knew that Mary was “a woman of God”: and so, he decided “to send her away quietly,” not accusing her publicly. Such was his intention until “the Lord intervened,” through an angel, in a dream, who explained how the child had been conceived in her through the Holy Spirit. And so “he believed and obeyed”:

“Joseph fought within himself; in that struggle, the voice of God [is heard]: ‘But get up’ — that ‘Get up’ [which is heard] so many times in the Bible at the beginning of a mission — ‘Take Mary, bring her to your home. Take charge of the situation; take this situation in hand and go forward.’ Joseph didn’t go to his friends be comforted; he didn’t go to a psychiatrist so that he could interpret the dream. No... He believed. And he went forward. He took the situation in hand. But what must you take in hand, Joseph? What was the situation? What was it that Joseph had to take up? Two things: fatherhood, and mystery.”

Taking charge of the fatherhood

First, the Pope continued, Joseph had to take charge of the “fatherhood.” And this is already implied in the genealogy of Jesus, which explains how He “was thought to be the son of Joseph: “He took on a paternity that was not his own: it came from the Father. And he went ahead with that fatherhood and all it signified: not only supporting Mary and the Child, but also raising the Child, teaching Him his trade, bringing Him up to manhood. ‘Take up a paternity that is not yours, but God’s.” And this, without saying a word. In the Gospel, there is not a single word spoken by Joseph. A man of silence, of silent obedience.”

Taking in hand the mystery of leading people back to God

Joseph is also the man who “takes in hand” the mystery. The first Mystery explains that it is the mystery of “bringing the people back to God,” the mystery of the re-Creation — which, as the liturgy tells us, is “even more wondrous” than the first. “Joseph took in hand this mystery and help: with silence, with his work, up to the moment when God called him to Himself. It is said of this man, who took up the fatherhood and the mystery, that he was the shadow of the Father: the shadow of God the Father. And if the man Jesus learned to say ‘daddy,’ ‘father,’ to His Father Who He knew as God, He learned it from life, from the witness of Joseph, the man who guarded [Him], the man who raised [Him], the man who carried forward every paternity and every mystery, but took nothing for himself.” This, Pope Francis said, is “the great Joseph,” who God needed to carry forward “the mystery of leading the people anew to the new Creation

Dear fellow prayer warriors,

I have to tell you what an amazing job you're doing and how God is answering your prayers. I do pro-life ministry online throughout the year and since the beginning of these Upland 40 Days for Life prayer vigils, I have consistently seen an increase in ministry effectiveness. Every time you are out there praying the difference is striking. Usually over several months I'm blessed to see one or two women choose life for their babies, but this past campaign we saw no less than 7 mothers change their minds from abortion to life in just 40 days. I am amazed and credit it to God's Grace and your prayers.

There is no more eloquent testimony to God's grace and mercy than the words of these mothers:

1. [...] he (the father) will love our daughter regardless and will be there if we decide to keep her, which I've already decided today to keep her and I plan on talking to him about it later [...] Thank you so so so much for your kind words and advice, I really appreciate it.
(This mom's baby girl is 14 weeks gestation.)
2. Thank you so much for your words- I have decided to keep the baby.
3. We are keeping the child and are both pretty excited to tackle this together ♡♡ Thank you so much! You were a huge reason I gained the confidence to say anything to him about it. I'm so very glad you messaged me yesterday! ♡♡
4. I hear you so loud and clear. The DMs (direct messages on social media) I am getting are so encouraging and are pointing out a trait in myself that I always knew was there - I always put others first and let myself take the brunt of the hurt. I have been dreaming of this for years.
5. i feel like the universe knew I needed you to reach out like this. I'm in a creative field also--voiceover and creative direction--so it's nice to hear from someone who is in a similar field.
6. i haven't really been going to church as often as i used to, i'm gonna try to go more and pray for my baby :)
(This 16 years old's parents we're trying to pressure her to abort, but she kept her baby and got the support she needed from family and the pro-life group online.)


