A RESTART

With Advent we begin a new church year as we renew our preparations for the coming of Christ. The scriptures show a profound movement from despair in the first reading, as we feel the wrath of God's anger and a sense of being abandoned, to the responsorial psalm, which begs us to turn toward God, and the second reading where we see a glimmer of hope. Brimstone returns in the Gospel. This sense of unease and pain is much like what we have endured throughout 2020 with COVID-19, racial struggles, and political campaigns. Frankly, everyone is ready for a restart, for a do-over, for a better year. We can understand the heartfelt prayer of the prophet Isaiah: "Oh, that you would rend the heavens and come down." Hide not your face from us, O God, but during these days of Advent may you reveal yourself to each of us once again.

BE WATCHFUL! BE ALERT!

When Jesus does not speak in eloquent sentences, but barks out imperative statements such as in our Gospel reading today, one can understand the urgency. There is no place for flowery language. "Be watchful! Be alert!" One has a sense that these should be written in bold or all caps! He tells the parable of the homeowner leaving his workers at home, with no knowledge of when he would return. Without phones and texts and travel schedules it could have meant the homeowner was returning sometime in the day, or sometime in the coming month or year. So Jesus is not telling us, "You have to behave for a little bit," but rather, "You must live your life and work like the homeowner is always here. You must always be prepared."

WATCH!

This author was very aware of the language of "master/servant" in the Gospel today and is reading it and praying it in light of discussions on racism in recent months. Perhaps this goes with the last imperative at the end of the parable to "Watch!" This year has taught us to be alert in our actions such as social distancing, masks, and sanitizing, as well as in our language and even our thoughts. Now how do we apply that to our spirituality, to our faith? For many, due to restrictions on numbers in church, singing, and choirs, this has meant learning to pray in a whole different way. The celebration of liturgy is the same as ever, with its focus always on the Word and the Eucharist, but for those in the pew, or still watching on livestream, the sense of active participation has taken on a very different meaning from how most of us have experienced liturgy in our lifetime. It feels like we have become spectators rather than participants. Perhaps this challenge can move us from complacency in our faith, to rediscover and relate to God in new ways, and call us to be even stronger in our personal faith. We must remain diligent. We must "watch." We must hope. We must love. We must pray.

UN REINICIO

Con el Adviento comenzamos un nuevo año de iglesia al renovar nuestros preparativos para la venida de Cristo. Las Escrituras muestran un profundo movimiento de la desesperación en la primera lectura, al sentir la ira de Dios y la sensación de ser abandonados, al salmo responsorial, que nos ruega que nos volvamos hacia Dios, y la segunda lectura donde vemos un destello de esperanza. Brimstone regresa en el Evangelio. Esta sensación de malestar y dolor es muy similar a lo que hemos soportado a lo largo de 2020 con COVID-19, luchas raciales y campañas políticas. Francamente, todo el mundo está listo para un reinicio, para un cambio, para un mejor año. Podemos entender la sincera oración del profeta Isaías: “Oh, que desgarras los cielos y bajas”. No escondas tu rostro de nosotros, oh Dios, pero durante estos días de Adviento que te reveles a cada uno de nosotros una vez más.

¡ESTÉN ATENTOS! ¡ESTÉN ALERTA!

Cuando Jesús no habla con frases elocuentes, lo hace con frases en imperativo que raspan, así como las de la lectura del Evangelio de hoy, uno puede entender la urgencia. No hay lugar para el lenguaje florido. “¡Estén atentos! ¡Estén alerta!” ¡Uno tiene la sensación de que deben escribirse en negritas o en mayúsculas! Él cuenta la parábola del dueño de la casa dejando a sus trabajadores en casa, sin decirles cuando va a regresar. Sin teléfonos, textos e itinerario de viaje podría haber significado que el dueño de la casa regresaría en algún momento del día, o en algún momento del próximo mes o año. Así que Jesús no nos dice “tienes que comportarte un poco”, sino más bien “debes vivir tu vida y trabajar como si el dueño de la casa estuviera siempre aquí. Debes estar siempre preparado”.

¡PERMANECE ALERTA!

Este autor era muy consciente del lenguaje de “dueño/esclavo” en el Evangelio de hoy y lo está leyendo y rezando a la luz de los debates del racismo de los últimos meses. Tal vez esto va con la última frase imperativa al final de la parábola “permanezcan alerta”. Este año nos ha enseñado a estar alerta en nuestras acciones como el mantener una distancia física, el uso del cubre bocas y el desinfectar superficies, así como en nuestro lenguaje e incluso en nuestros pensamientos. Ahora, ¿cómo empleamos eso a nuestra espiritualidad, a nuestra fe? Para muchas personas, debido a las restricciones al número de personas permitido en la iglesia y en los coros, esto ha significado aprender a rezar de una manera totalmente diferente. La celebración de la liturgia es la misma de siempre, con su enfoque en la Palabra y en la Eucaristía, pero para aquellas personas que están en las bancas o que la ven transmitida en las redes sociales o en la TV, el sentido de la participación activa toma un significado muy diferente de cómo la mayoría de nosotros hemos experimentado la liturgia en nuestra vida. Se siente como si nos hubiéramos convertido en espectadores en lugar de participantes. Tal vez este desafío puede hacernos pasar del exceso de confianza en nuestra fe, a redescubrir y relacionarnos con Dios de nuevas maneras y llamarnos a ser aún más fuertes en nuestra fe personal. Debemos seguir siendo perseverantes. Debemos “permanecer alerta”. Debemos tener esperanza. Debemos amar. Debemos rezar.


The Military Ministry at St Peter St Paul is currently seeking parishioners with family members serving in the military.



Black Catholic History Month: Six African American men and women on the road to Sainthood

November is a special month for Catholics of African descent as they celebrate with the Church the joys and sorrows of being black and Catholic. The history of African descent people to the Church of Jesus Christ is a history of force. The forcing of Simon of Cyrene to help Jesus carry the cross. Then Simon empathized and then he loved. It is the curiosity search and the spirit of Ethiopian eunuch that led to his baptism. It is a history like no other. But look where we are today.

Slaves were forced to attend the church of their masters and so they stayed and helped to build it, irrespective of the treatments they received. They came and believed in one true Catholic church. But even before then, the Spaniards as they came, converting the Native Americans, came with free black people. History tells us that we have been here from the beginning of this country's church and have also been here from the beginning with our Lord Jesus the Christ. And so, as we celebrate this year's November, I would like to mention the six African American men and women on the road to sainthood.



Pierre Toussaint Venerable Pierre Toussaint, a high-end hairdresser. When his owner was about to die, she wished him released after her death. He used his money to buy back lots of black people from slavery and give them their freedom.



Henriette Delille Venerable Henriette Delille - from a rich family but fought for blacks and Indians with her inheritance and started a congregation that fought with her and accepted black women into her convent.



Fr. Augustus Tolton The Venerable Father Augustus Tolton - recognized as the first black priest in the U.S. because the Healys passed as white and hid their race. Fr. Tolton was born into slavery, suffered immensely on his journey to priesthood and suffered even more as a priest, dying very young in his priesthood.



Julia Greeley Servant of God Julia Greeley, who practically lived on the street. She used all her money as a house cleaner/cook to care for those who lived on the street. She gave her life that those on the street might have a better life.



Mother Mary Lange Servant of God Mother Mary Lange, a freewoman who dedicated her life by risking it to teach children in hidden rooms on the church grounds in Baltimore, keeping her safe. She later founded the Oblate Sisters.



Sr. Thea Bowman And here Servant of God Sister Thea Bowman - a Franciscan Sister of Perpetual Adoration. She was a shooting star, an evangelizer of her own people, she evangelized the world. When she was asked what it means to be black and Catholic, she answered that one comes to church "fully functioning" meaning that she comes to church ready. She said "I bring myself, my black self, all that I am, all that I have, all that I hope to become, I bring my whole history, my traditions, my experience, my culture, my African American song and dance and gesture and movement and teaching and preaching and healing and responsibility as gift to the church."

And that is what people of African descent bring to the church, their uniqueness.

Pope Francis: The poor are at the heart of the Gospel

Vatican City, Nov 15, 2020 / 04:35 am MT ([CNA](#)).- Pope Francis said that the needy are at the heart of the Gospel as he celebrated a Mass marking World Day of the Poor Sunday. In his [homily](#) in St. Peter's Basilica Nov. 15, the pope urged Catholics to take risks to help the millions of people worldwide who live below the poverty line. "Do not forget: the poor are at the center of the Gospel; the Gospel cannot be understood without the poor," he said, adding: "**The poor guarantee us an eternal income and even now they help us become rich in love.** For the

worst kind of poverty needing to be combatted is our poverty of love." Pope Francis celebrated the Mass at the Altar of the Chair in St. Peter's Basilica on the fourth annual observance of the World Day of the Poor, which falls on the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time. Along with volunteers and benefactors, around 100 people were present in the basilica, symbolically representing the world's poor. The congregation sat spaced out wearing face masks. Some wore yellow vests bearing the World Day of the Poor logo. Coronavirus restrictions forced the Vatican to [scale down](#) this year's commemoration of the World Day of the Poor. The pope could not host a lunch for poor inhabitants of Rome after Mass as he had in previous years. The Vatican was also unable to provide a "field hospital" for the poor in St. Peter's Square as it had in the past, though it is providing free coronavirus tests in the clinic under the colonnade of St. Peter's. In his homily, the pope reflected on this Sunday's Gospel reading, Matthew 25:14-30, known as the Parable of the Talents, in which a master entrusts talents to his servants. The pope explained that one talent was equivalent to the income from 20 years' work. The pope said that at the center of the parable was the question of service. "**In the Gospel,**" he noted, "**good servants are those who take risks.** They are not fearful and overcautious, they do not cling to what they possess, but put it to good use. For if goodness is not invested, it is lost, and the grandeur of our lives is not measured by how much we save but by the fruit we bear." **He continued:** "**It is sad when Christians play a defensive game, content only to observe rules and obey commandments.**" The pope said that this risk-averse attitude was summed up in the figure of the lazy servant, who failed to invest his talent. "**The master actually calls him 'wicked.'** And yet he did nothing wrong! But he did nothing good either. He preferred to sin by omission rather than to risk making a mistake," he said. The pope added: "The Lord asks us instead to be generous, to conquer fear with the courage of love, to overcome the passivity that becomes complicity. Today, in these times of uncertainty and instability, let us not waste our lives thinking only of ourselves, or deluding ourselves into thinking: 'peace and security!' (1 Thessalonians 5:3)." Francis said that at the end of our lives success, power and money will be revealed as illusions, while love will be shown to be true riches. "If we do not want to live life poorly, let us ask for the grace to see Jesus in the poor, to serve Jesus in the poor," he said. At the end of his homily, the pope paid tribute to Fr. Roberto Malgesini, who was [stabbed to death](#) in Como, Italy, Sept. 15. The 51-year-old priest was known for his [devotion](#) to the homeless and migrants. "I would like to thank all those faithful servants of God who quietly live in this way. I think, for example, of Fr. Roberto Malgesini. **This priest was not interested in theories; he simply saw Jesus in the poor and found meaning in life in serving them.** He dried their tears with his gentleness, in the name of God who consoles," he said. "The beginning of his day was prayer, to receive God's gifts; the center of his day was charity, to make the love he had received bear fruit; the end was his clear witness to the Gospel. This man realized that he had to stretch out his hand to all those poor people he met daily, for he saw Jesus in each of them." "**Let us ask for the grace to be Christians not in word, but in deed.** To bear fruit, as Jesus desires. So be it." In June, the World Bank estimated that the pandemic will push 100 million people into [extreme poverty](#) this year, increasing global poverty rates for the first time in decades. **More than 200 million people are believed to have lost their jobs as a result of the pandemic.** In his [message](#) for the 2020 World Day of the Poor, the pope said: "This pandemic arrived suddenly and caught us unprepared, sparking a powerful sense of bewilderment and helplessness. This has made us all the more aware of the presence of the poor in our midst and their need for help." Pope Francis established the World Day of the Poor in the [apostolic letter](#) "Misericordia et misera," published Nov. 20, 2016, at the end of the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy. He decreed that it should be celebrated on the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time, in preparation for the [Solemnity of our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe](#), "**who identified with the little ones and the poor and who will judge us on our works of mercy.**" "It would be a day to help communities and each of the baptized to reflect on how poverty is at the very heart of the Gospel and that, as long as Lazarus lies at the door of our homes, there can be no justice or social peace," he wrote. "**This Day will also represent a genuine form of new evangelization which can renew the face of the Church as She perseveres in her perennial activity of pastoral conversion and witness to mercy.**"



CATHOLIC CHURCH LITURGICAL CALENDAR 2019-2020



Have you ever wondered when Ordinary Time or Lent or Advent starts or ends? Listed below is the entire 2019-2020 Liturgical Calendar of seasons. As defined by the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the Liturgical Year is "The celebration throughout the year of the mysteries of the Lord's birth, life, death, and Resurrection in such a way that the entire year becomes a 'year of the Lord's grace.'"

The Season of Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas (December 1, 2019) and ends after the mid-afternoon prayer on Christmas Eve (December 24, 2019).

The Christmas Season begins with Evening Prayer on Christmas Eve (December 24, 2019) and ends with Evening Prayer on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (January 12, 2020).

Ordinary Time begins after Evening Prayer on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (January 12, 2020) until Ash Wednesday (February 26, 2020).

The Season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday (February 26, 2020) and ends with the Celebration of the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday (April 9, 2020).

The Paschal Triduum begins on Holy Thursday with the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper (April 9, 2020) and ends with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday (April 12, 2020).

The Easter Season begins on Easter Sunday (April 12, 2020) and ends with Evening Prayer on the Solemnity of Pentecost (May 31, 2020).

Ordinary Time begins after Evening Prayer on the Solemnity of Pentecost (May 31, 2020) and continues until Evening Prayer of the First Sunday of Advent (November 29, 2020).
