



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SHARING GOD'S GIFTS

Isn't it comforting to know that others have struggles with low self-esteem? Today Isaiah calls himself a man with "unclean lips." Paul is "not fit to be called an apostle." Simon Peter tells Jesus (perhaps unnecessarily) "I am a sinful man." All of these may be true, but God chose these three—unclean, unfit, sinful—as important, essential messengers in the work of salvation. We all can remember this whenever we are tempted to view ourselves as unqualified for (or excuse ourselves from) sharing the Good News. Having a low opinion of ourselves isn't humility. Truth be told, it's a kind of arrogance to think that God cannot work through us. It's a good thing to be aware of and honest about our failings or limitations, but we also give glory to God by acknowledging what we are able to do, by sharing the gifts that God has granted us.

RECEIVING THE CALL

All three readings today feature what are known as the "call" stories of famous figures of our faith: Isaiah, Paul, and Simon Peter. Each story shares features common to scriptural "call" stories: First, an encounter with God or a messenger of God. Second, there is some sort of resistance, usually framed as a claim of unworthiness. Third, the one who has been called receives an assurance that they are, indeed, fit for the mission. In this way God has continued to call prophets, apostles, saints, and everyday women and men throughout time. It is unlikely that any of us will receive a "call" as dramatic as fiery angels in the temple, a booming voice from heaven striking us down, or sitting side-by-side in a boat with Jesus of Nazareth. This doesn't mean we can't, or won't, or haven't received a call from God. It may even be a "spillover" from somebody else's, the way James and John are called through Jesus giving Simon Peter his mission.

SINFUL MAN, HOLY MAN

We can likely identify with Simon Peter who, in today's Gospel passage, is really having a bad day at work. When your job is to catch fish, and you're not catching fish, it's a bad day. To top it off, he knows he is in the presence of a holy man in the person of this Jesus of Nazareth, who had just commandeered his boat to do some spontaneous preaching. As good as the preaching may have been, it surely didn't put fish in the nets. So, as he will throughout the gospel, Jesus rectifies the situation. Simon Peter knows he's not merely in the presence of a holy man, but of holiness itself, and de-

clares his sinfulness. Nevertheless, he is commissioned for the work of the Gospel. No matter how bad our day may be going, or how incompetent we think we are, we are receiving the call. Our role in the story? Listen.

TODAY'S READINGS

Isaiah 6:1–2a, 3–8 Psalm 138:1–2, 2–3, 4–5, 7–8 1 Corinthians 15:1–11 [3–8, 11] Luke 5:1–11

Listen with the heart, now!

A commentary on the readings of the 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Is 6:1-2a, 3-8: This is a vision which includes the vocation or the call of Isaiah. The final editors of the book of the prophet Isaiah placed this story here in order to frame the whole book under the theme "God is with us". This theme would link vocation or God's call with mission: God calls in order to entrust to a person a mission. God's call, which is a free and gratuitous gift, asks of the one called a commitment. The person called is made to realize his/her unworthiness. In this case, Isaiah receives his vocation in the most sacred

place to emphasize the tremendous presence of God that makes him realize his impurity. But God overwhelms him with his sanctity. In the late tradition of Israel, it was believed that no one stays alive after seeing God. This was the fruit of their excessive sacralization of God's presence. But here is Isaiah's corrective: the tremendous presence of God purifies the prophet, who has an excessive mystical and sacralized image of God. God's closeness to Isaiah aims to renew him, to free him from total dehumanization, but never to destroy him. Isaiah now, transformed before the Lord, rushes to offer himself without delay to the service of the mission of

1 Cor 15:1-11: The call and mission of Paul: handing over the tradition of Christ's death and resurrection. This marks the conclusion of Paul's exposition of the theme: Charisms or gifts of the Spirit and their use in the Christian community. He does this by answering the ultimate question: How can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? (v. 12). This question arises because of the Greek philosophical thought that influenced some people in the Corinthian community. Greek thought separated the soul from the body and valued only the soul, reducing the body to a despicable and perishable matter. If in death the "soul" is freed from the "body", what is the point of recovering it, locking it up or burying itself again in the "body" through a possible future bodily resurrection? Paul sees this absurdity through a play of words (in Greek): It would be as if the soul returned again to the tomb ("sema" in Greek) of the body ("soma" in Greek). The consequences of accepting this thought can be seen in the life and behavior of some in the Corinthian community: the moral indifference towards everything related to the body, including sexuality (6:12); or lack of sensitivity to the situation of the poorest and most marginalized in the community (cf. 8:1-12; 10:23). These they justify by accepting Jesus' resurrection and enjoying it with the spiritual euphoria of that supposed freedom and superior knowledge that certain misunderstood charisms provided them (cf. 14:12-19).

Thus, Paul faces this squarely now, linking Jesus' resurrection with ours. Solemnity is the mood of his presentation because this touches on the fundamentals of the Gospel that he earlier preached to them and which they accepted with faith. This Good News has been already established as a "confession of faith" ("I handed on to you what I also received: that Christ died for our sins...After that he appeared to James, then to all the apostles.") around the two correlative events: death and resurrection of Jesus. A death that forgives sins leads to the resurrection. Grave signifies death, while insistence on the apparitions bears witness to life. Paul's recourse to the "traditional confession of faith" is probably caused by some questioning his authority as an Apostle. At the end, after citing those witnesses, Paul sets himself in equal footing as those witnesses even though he places himself last in the line. Indeed, the apostolic witness of men and women who saw, spoke and ate with risen Jesus is fundamental to our faith. But the resurrection of Jesus is as much a "historical reality" as also equally a "reality of faith". Or more than just a "historical reality" but more especially a "reality of faith". And the Church, from her beginnings, has always been a community summoned and gathered around this "reality of faith" founded on the witnesses of the resurrection, the Apostles which included Paul.

Lk 5:1-11: The call and mission of the first disciples: fishers of men and women. With the sign of the huge catch of fish, Jesus plants into Simon the seed of his calling. Simon senses this extraordinary divine intervention and is only able to make a response of confession: Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man. But God does not leave a man He has called just because of his sinful condition. While Simon pleads to Jesus to stay away from him, Jesus instead draws himself closer to Simon. He animates Simon with the biblical words that soothe a person who discovers the immensity of divine presence: Do not fear! Simon Peter and his companions, despite their sinful condition, are invited to trust in the Word and to be multipliers of that Word in whose name they will obtain abundant catches, not of fish but of men.

This really is our fundamental calling and vocation as Christians and Catholics. We are inheritors of this prophetic heritage of the OT and of Jesus, the Only Prophet. We are inheritors of this great catholic and apostolic Tradition. Despite our unworthiness, despite our being "not witnesses of the historical fact of the resurrection" but only recipients of the tradition of the "reality of faith in the resurrection", despite our human condition of sinfulness – our being sinners – we are called by God, by Jesus, by the Holy Spirit in our time to be multipliers of the Word, to be multipliers of God's blessings, to draw men and women to the Spring of Salvation in love, in justice and in truth. May we use our talents and skills, our professions and leisure to catch men and women for the Kingdom of God.

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CALL ME OUT!

In 2 Samuel 9, we find a story of a disabled man whose name is Meribbaal. He was born as a prince; he was the grandson of King Saul. His dad, Jonathan, and uncle were killed, leading to his grandpa's death. Meribbaal then became an orphan and grew up living in a town called Lodebar. Lodebar means "no pasture, no communication." The grandson of King Saul, who was in line for kingship, is now crippled in a foreign land. They would have killed him in those barbaric times so that Meribbaal would not revolt and claim his throne. I can imagine the fear one can live in knowing he can be killed so that he would not reclaim what belongs to him. One day, an employee from the palace shared with King David that someone still lives from King Saul's lineage, so King David began to look for Meribbaal.

Once the army found Meribbaal disabled, he was carried to King David. King David told him that he knew his father very well and promised him that he would always care for his family. King David then decides to give back Meribbaal all the lands and houses that be-

long to his grandpa. King David also said he would always be a guest at his table. I love this story because it talks about redemption and hope. The most difficult miracles in the life of Meribbaal followed him. His royal lineage was returned to him, his properties were returned to him, and his wealth was returned to him. What is shocking about this story is that he gets everything back, but he does not receive the healing of walking again.

Maybe today, you are living a miracle that at first glance is incomplete; perhaps today, the majority of us are praying for a miracle that has been seventy-five percent answered. There is still that percentage that worries us because it is still incomplete. If you had asked me, what would have been easier for God to give Meribbaal? I would say to heal his legs rather than to give him back his riches. There is a miracle greater than our physical healing; the greatest gift in the life of Meribbaal was restoring his identity and recognizing his royal blood. That is what is happening with us, God is always restoring our identity as royalty because we are his beloved children. We can always pray to receive all these material things so that we can feel better in our own lives, but there is still that emptiness. Instead, we should be praying to restore our identity so that we can feel empowered. In this story, King David mirrors Christ by restoring to Meribbaal his identity. So let us also believe that God will remind us of who we already are in his beloved son Jesus.

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The Conversion of St. Paul—Mark Hart

How cold and hard the earth must have felt as his body was thrust down upon it! The ground itself may have been the only thing colder or harder than Saul's heart that day. How brilliant the light must have been and how blinding the vision! That temporary blindness would later offer him true vision for the rest of his earthly days.

The road was little more than a path of dirt covered with small jagged rocks and pebbles. It was far from a desirable place to lay your head, much less land on. How humbling it must have been for Saul, powerful Saul, to quickly go from being the hunter to the *hunted*. How ironic that he landed upon the earth when God humbled him, for both *ground* and *humility* share the same root word in Latin (a language Saul certainly knew).

The dirt was caked upon his face. His vision blurred, but his hearing must have sharpened. Saul's companions stood speechless, but Christ did not.

In a flash, everything Saul knew, everything he had learned during his years of Rabbinical study, was rendered almost irrelevant. In one instant, he went from being certain of his righteousness and superiority among God's children to staring God in the face and going blind. The revelation was not only one of God's identity or Saul's shortsightedness; Saul's *self-righteousness* was revealed.

"Why are you persecuting me?" asked his new lord, the Lord, Jesus Christ.

How painful these words must have been to Saul. How many bloodstained memories must have rushed back to Saul's subconsciousness. No doubt in his blindness he recalled the faces of those he had hunted down and persecuted—faces like Stephen's. How gruesome the images, how deep the pain, and how humbling the guilt overflowing in his soul as he realized he had helped kill his own brothers and sisters, sons and daughters of his God and Father.

Those he had helped condemn, those he had called "apostates" he would now call brothers.

Can you relate to Saul at all? Answer the following questions, and record your answers in a journal for further reflection.

- Do you look at your sins as not only greiving (or hurting) other people (your brothers and sisters), but actions that grieve Jesus himself? Think of an example.
- How would you describe your experience or vision of God? Is it as intimate or personal as Saul's?
- Do you feel like God calls you by name, and even knows your name?
- Have you been feeling that God doesn't notice you or seem to care about what you do? If so, why?
- Is your vision of God one of an absent Father who is far from active in your life, or is it one of a loving, ever-present Father?

If some of these questions strike a nerve in you (like they do in me), then perhaps your vision of God needs to change—just like Saul's did.

The God Saul encountered that day was different than the God he had come to know on his own. When Saul was humbled, he was startled; when he was blinded, he began to truly see. That's what grace does—it gives us the eyes of faith.

Saul was about to undergo the greatest change in his life. After encountering Christ face-to-face in such a profound way, everything about Saul would change starting with his name.
