



A NEW DAY

The story of Easter reveals that the world has begun a new day. The darkness of the Crucifixion has opened into the light of Easter. Like the dawn that gradually opened to the disciples on the first Easter morning, we slowly begin to see what the light of faith reveals. Death will not have the final word, because Christ is risen and we will share in his resurrection. Injustice and suffering will not continue forever, because God's victory over sin has begun, and will be completed when Christ returns. Evil has met its match, because through Jesus, God has brought a new energy into the world. This energy can be found in followers of Christ who are free to love, empowered by the Spirit to embrace everyone, without exception. May we bear the light of Christ, with humility and courage, into our troubled world.

RE-INTERPRETING OUR WORLD

Our Gospel reading from John captures the initial confusion of Jesus' followers on Easter morning. Mary thinks the body has been stolen, and the two disciples see an empty tomb, but do not understand. We can sympathize with their initial misreading, as they are interpreting what happened within how they understand the way the world works: Jesus was crushed by the authorities—end of story. Jesus' later appearances to them will dramatically shift their perception of God, the world, and themselves.

This work of re-interpreting the world in light of the death and resurrection of Jesus continues today. In his passion and death, Jesus showed that true power, God's power, emerges through humility and forgiveness. We join in the death and resurrection of Jesus when we surrender the attractions of power, status, and comfort, and embrace non-violence, service, and care for the suffering. The path to bringing peace and goodness to the world is not through seeking control, but through sacrificial love.

BOTH PETER AND CORNELIUS

Peter's speech in today's passage from Acts summarizes the ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus. The speech occurs within his encounter with Cornelius, a Roman centurion and his household. We can perhaps imagine being Cornelius, led by God to hear the story of Jesus. Or we can imagine being Peter, led by the Spirit to share the Good News of Jesus. As followers of Christ, we are called to embrace both, in our imaginations and our lives.

We are continually called to hear the story of Jesus. We know that God's Good News has entered us, but also know that it has not. There is much in our hearts that needs conver-

sion and begs for God's mercy, so we always seek God's challenging and healing word. We are also continually called to share the story of Jesus, sometimes directly but more often in our actions. Our lives can speak of God's love, healing and encouraging others. We are both Peter and Cornelius.





Let Us Listen with Your Heart.... Commentary on the Readings of

Easter Sunday of the Lord's Resurrection.

Commentary on Acts 10:34,37-43:

Cornelius was a Roman citizen, god-fearing and devout. In the eyes of the Jews, he was a gentile, a pagan. Peter was a Jew, but now a focused follower of Jesus Christ. God has called Cornelius to faith in Jesus Christ. Peter was the instrument of his conversion, by proclaiming to him the events concerning Jesus of Nazareth: what he did, what he spoke, what happened to him: his suffering, death and resurrection. God does not discriminate: he welcomes every-

one to become a member of his Church, notwithstanding one's class origin and class orientation, race and ethnicity, gender and sexual preference and religion, or the lack of it. The essential thing is to share one's faith-experience of Jesus Christ, preached and given witness to by the Church. Thus, one receives forgiveness and is made new.

Commentary on Ps 118:

Though this psalm is an individual hymn of thanksgiving, it is really composed of two songs. The first is in the first person singular: vv. 1-21; and the second is in the first person plural, vv. 23-27. The transition is v. 22. Vv. 28-29 go back to the individual who repeats the opening verse. On the other hand, it can be said that the psalm has two parts, for another reason: the first part takes place in the tents of the people in Jerusalem (vv. 5-18); the second occurs in the temple (vv. 19-29). The reason for thanksgiving is the individual's experience of God's mercy that has liberated him. But the individual experience is also a community experience. He who had suffered - the stone rejected by the builders -God has made into a cornerstone: a strong foundation of faith, in the temple.

Commentary on Col 3:1-4:

By baptism in Christ, the believer has become a new person: raised with Christ, he leaves behind the old ways of life, mired in sin and egoism, in selfishness and injustice. Now he instead seeks the values of heaven, the values of God's kingdom, the values that Jesus died and rose for: love, compassion, forgiveness, justice, equality, truth, freedom, peace. Thus, one who is baptized in Christ lives firmly in the world. His task is to transform it, according to the realities of heaven, where Christ lives. It is the way of living Christ on earth. Then, when Christ appears, he who lives in Him will be with Him in glory.

Commentary on John 20:1-9:

The resurrection of Jesus is narrated to us through the finding of the empty tomb. In this regard, John is telling us that the empty tomb proclaims that Jesus is alive. We do not seek him among the dead but we will find him among the living. We note that these three persons who discover the empty tomb are the closest disciples of Jesus. Mary Magdalene stands out in her devotion to Jesus; Peter is the recognized leader who dares to enter the tomb; and the beloved disciple of Jesus after hesitating eventually follows Peter. It was he who saw the empty tomb and believed. When they return home, they will find Jesus alive in the hearts of those who believe.


The Feast of Easter – the Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus – is the greatest feast of our Christian Life. Christmas – and our birth – is only meaningful because of the Resurrection. Our struggles in life – the ordinariness of daily life to love, to exist, to eke out a living, to be of service to others by doing justice and working for peace – take their meaning from the fact of the Resurrection. Our successes and failures, good health and sickness, joy and suffering that all end in death only make sense because of the Resurrection. The story of Cornelius, the invitation to believe, to seek forgiveness, reconciliation and conversion is our story.

Biblical faith is historical and concrete. It is an articulation of God's saving deeds in history; it is a remembering of the concrete experiences of Jesus in his acts of love and compassion that led him to suffering, death and resurrection. More than just a set of formulas and doctrinal statements which we can memorize and repeat each time we are asked, biblical creed invites us to live our faith in the concrete, by sharing in Jesus' love and compassion. It is an invitation to suffer and die for this love of the other, especially the poor and the little ones, and thus participate in the gift of the resurrection.

This faith is both a personal and community commitment. One is incomplete without the other. In the contemporary language, we are called to offer ourselves for the Common Good. Never for ourselves. Even though we are infected with the modern existential belief of self-love, which is not Christian love at all. In the biblical tradition – and in our profound Catholic conviction – self-love is a contradiction! Because the center of God's love is not God. God is not narcissistic. We are the center of God's love. The Son of God had to leave Heaven in order to be in solidarity with the deepest pit of the human condition – except sin – so that by his suffering and death we might be saved and participate in the fullness of life in the resurrection. The gift of the Holy Spirit was lobbed into our flesh so that our body would no longer just breathe ordinary fresh oxygen but the breath of God that sanctifies, strengthens, transforms and divinizes us as children of God.

That is why we must preserve, uphold and defend the gains of the resurrection, the values of the Kingdom which we
